

An International Tribute



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



POTTER-WRIGHT BUILDING

A Commitment to Preservation

To continue our rich tradition of historic preservation and downtown revitalization, the Potter-Wright Building was selected as a location for the hotel. This 1902 structure, which was vacant and decaying for more than twenty-five years, is undergoing rehabilitation to become an event and lodging facility called Hotel Garber.



WHY HOTFI GARBER?

Foundation and Community Priority

A new hotel in Red Cloud has been a priority for the Willa Cather Foundation and other community leaders for more than a decade. A lack of available rooms inhibits our ability to fulfill our mission, as visitors are routinely unable to secure lodging in Red Cloud for conferences and events. An independent market feasibility study concluded that the Red Cloud market could support an additional lodging establishment of up to 30 rooms.

Space to Stay and Create

The design includes a 27-room boutique hotel, meeting space, lounge, catering facilities, and a small library. A street-level entrance will provide access to a lower-level Creative Hub with meeting rooms available for workshops, residencies, and other events.

A Long Time Coming

Planning for this rehabilitation effort began as early as 2018. Basement excavation and underpinning was completed in 2020 to support the return of a third floor that was lost to fire in 1961. Construction on the Potter-Wright Building resumed in 2022 and is projected to be complete in 2024.

Pledges are payable over 5 years, and gifts of \$1,000 and up will be recognized on a donor wall.





In addition to his scholarly work, he writes creatively and has been published in *Ekstasis*, *Road Not Taken*, *Flyover Country*, and *Front Porch Republic*.

Sallie Ketcham comes from a long line of Nebraskans. She is the author of Laura Ingalls Wilder: American Writer on the Prairie (Routledge). Her recent work has been included in the South Dakota History Journal, The Willa Cather Review, and is forthcoming in Cather Studies 14. She is particularly interested in the life and times of early twentieth-century writers Laura Ingalls Wilder, Rose Wilder Lane, Willa Cather, and Mari Sandoz.

Sharon Kohout has been an active member of the Cather Foundation since retiring from the Centers for Disease Control in 2012. Early in her career she was a lecturer in the English Department at Texas Tech University (Lubbock, Texas). Dr. Nathan Tye is assistant professor of history at the University of Nebraska at Kearney. A historian of Great Plains and Midwest culture, literature, and labor, he has published in *The Willa Cather Review*, *The Walt Whitman Quarterly Review*, *Annals of Iowa*, and *Nebraska History*.

Xuesong Zhou is an Associate Professor at Zhengzhou University, China, and Deputy Director of The Center for English Studies at Zhengzhou University, and a Visiting Scholar at University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Her study on Willa Cather has won the National Social Science Fund of China, and her research interests include Cather studies, having published on top-ranking Chinese academic journals a series of critical essays interpreting Willa Cather's *One of Ours, The Professor's House, Death Comes for the Archbishop*, and "Neighbor Rosicky," and theoretical studies on Gilles Deleuze and Félix Guattari's "deterritorialization," Hannah Arendt's "action," theories of community, ethics of care, and new materialism.
